

Abide Women's Health
Services exists to improve
birth outcomes in
communities in Dallas, Texas,
with the lowest quality of care
by offering healthcare and

What the grant is going toward ...

At the heart of their efforts is the Easy Access Clinic™, which provides crucial prenatal and postnatal services, as well as comprehensive childbirth education. Through this initiative, Abide redefines maternal health standards, ensuring every mother, irrespective of their background, experiences exceptional care.

CHILDREN OF PROMISE, NYC

Children of Promise, NYC is a community-centered organization that partners with children and families impacted by mass incarceration to dismantle the stigma and to heal from the trauma plaguing Black and Brown communities. Their innovative model colocates youth development programming with a mental



health clinic to provide holistic services for children of incarcerated parents, all under one roof.

What the grant is going toward ...

Children of Promise, NYC's Youth Violence Prevention Program uses an evidence-based curriculum to specifically address the possibility of already at-risk youth joining gangs and falling into violence and substance abuse. Through the workshops, students will develop greater self confidence and learn new mechanisms to cope with anxiety and resist peer pressure.



COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT FUND

The Community Empowerment
Fund (CEF) seeks to eradicate
the racial wealth gap and ensure
equal access to affordable
housing in Durham and Orange
Counties of North Carolina. CEF
addresses the root causes of
cyclical poverty and
homelessness through unique
relationship-based support and
targeted financial tools.

What the grant is going toward ...

CEF's Advocate Program combines person-centered support with innovative financial services to help BIPOC individuals and families overcome immediate barriers to stability while also addressing the root causes of homelessness and poverty. CEF Advocates are trained in principles of racial equity and trauma-informed care.

CORNERSTORE

Cornerstone Corporation is a place-based, pro-Black, Christian Community Development Corporation that has been providing affordable housing for over 45 years in St. Louis, Missouri. Recognizing that housing is just a piece of the puzzle, they expanded their work to support resident-led community development and healing-centered economic mobility programming that honors the dignity of families.



What the grant is going toward ...

Cornerstone Corporation seeks to disrupt historical approaches and assumptions associated with economic mobility by presenting a model of community development centered on healing. Their *In the Black Fellows* program offers a healing space, peer learning, one-on-one planning and coaching, and access to seed capital to support renters on their pathway to healing from money trauma on their own terms.



LEAP LITERACY PROGRAM

LEAP's mission is to remove the barriers to equity and access for New York City's most underserved and underrepresented youth by providing quality educational arts programs with a strategic focus on social-emotional learning and cognitive skill-development. Every year LEAP serves upwards of 20,000 children across 140 schools in all five boroughs.

What the grant is going toward ...

Their flagship program LEAP Literacy engages a multisensory fusion of visual arts, music, drama, and movement to ignite a passion for learning in Pre-K to 5th grade students. With an intentional focus on uplifting the literacy skills of non-native speakers—and this year, zeroing in on the unique needs of migrant and asylum-seeking youth—LEAP Literacy transcends traditional instruction. Their approach aims to unlock each child's untapped potential, serving as a catalyst for transformative learning and lifelong achievement.

PROYECTO PASTORAL

Proyecto Pastoral is a multiservice, social justice, community-empowerment organization located in the Boyle Heights community of Los Angeles, California. Their mission is to empower the community of Boyle Heights through grassroots projects in education, leadership, and service.




What the grant is going toward ...

Their Education Pipeline programming provides cradle to college and career support impacting 4,000+ students in Boyle Heights, the majority of whom come from immigrant families with a high percentage of English learners. They provide a foundation for educational success at their early learning centers; critical youth development programming outside of school time; one-on-one support for high potential students at risk of dropping out; as well as strategy planning with the entire school system and postsecondary supports.

RE-CENTER RACE AND EQUITY IN EDUCATION

RE-Center Race and Equity in Education is committed to building an equitable and just world where everyone has what they need to grow and thrive. Their mission is to drive transformative change toward racially just schools and communities and to nurture spaces where people can



understand and challenge systemic racism and oppression.

What the grant is going toward ...

RE-Center will host Developing and Operationalizing a Racial Equity Lens, a learning and coaching series around diversity, equity, inclusion, and racial justice (DEIRJ) practices for nonprofit leaders and staff in Greater Hartford, Connecticut. Their goal is to support building understanding and application of a model to operationalize DEIRJ in their own work, in turn equipping them to directly impact the communities they serve.



SEE FOREVER FOUNDATION

The Maya Angelou Schools and the See Forever Foundation seek to change the trajectory of young people in Washington, D.C., who have struggled to succeed in traditional school settings but who haven't given up on their future hopes and dreams. They work to dismantle the school to prison pipeline and to support young people who have already fallen victim to this cycle by providing the wraparound supports they need.

What the grant is going toward ...

The See Forever Institute will host the inaugural 2024 Opportunity and Justice-Involved Youth Convening to provide leaders in this space the chance to exchange ideas and innovative approaches to building a stronger education system for the at-promise student population. The conference theme "Building Bridges" takes an innovative approach to transforming education and recognizes the crucial role educators play and aims to equip them with skills to drive meaningful change.

I commit to knowing, getting, and doing better than I did yesterday — keeping in mind **my commitment to Live Inclusively® is a journey, not a destination.**
